<b>Catalog Course Description:</b>	Provides professionals (police, fire, coaches, athletic trainers, life guards, educators, public safety, medical and dental personnel, etc.) with knowledge and skills in providing basic emergency medical care until further assistance arrives. Focus on cardiopulmonary resuscitation (2 person CPR) training for the professional. Certification will be granted upon successful completion.
